Thank you for your email dated 20/6/21.

I am sorry for oversighting your previous email.

As per my email dated 30/4/21, the City has an Integrated pest management program where it looks at other ways of controlling pests beside using herbicides. In 2014, the City commenced the use of steam control for weeds by an external contractor at a number of selected road precincts as an alternative to herbicide use. in 2018, the City commenced the use of steam control in sensitive areas which includes schools, child care centres and aged care. This year the City commenced the use of steam in all public access ways and asphalted right of ways.

The City has recommended a program to phase out glyphosate within road reservation making incremental increases of steam over the next four years. This program has been approved by council, subject to funding approval in each subsequent financial year. In the next financial year the City is planning to increase steam usage from 26% to 66%. The staging of these steam application increases has been split and prioritised to fit in with the most practical separation of the assets to be treated and against the level of risk of the public coming into contact with glyphosate. The recommended program shows in 2024/25 that the City road reserves should be glyphosate free.

The City understands this may not be the answer you sought. However, should you wish to discuss this matter further please do not hesitate to me.

Thank you for your enquiry regarding weed spraying in the City of Stirling.

The City uses only approved herbicides that are registered with the Australian Pesticide and Veterinary Medicines Authority to control weeds.

If you have any concerns and you do not wish the City to spray in front of your property you can be placed on a "No spray list". To request for your property to be added on the Pesticide No Spray Register, please visit <u>www.stirling.wa.gov.au</u> search 'Pests and Weeds' and complete the online Pesticide Notification and No Spray Registration form.

For your information, the City has an Integrated pest management program where it looks at other ways of controlling pests beside using herbicides. In 2014, the City commenced the use of steam control for weeds by an external contractor at a number of selected road precincts as an alternative to herbicide use. in 2018, the City commenced the use of steam control in sensitive areas which includes schools, child care centers and aged care. This year the City commenced the use of steam in all public access ways and asphalted right of ways.

The City limits the potential exposure of herbicides through the following controls:

a. Shrouded spray nozzles which limits spray drift;

b. Spot spraying of weeds, not continuous spraying, which reduces quantity of chemical used;

- c. No spraying in winds of more than 10km/h which limits spray drift;
- d. A "No spray" list which reduces quantity of chemicals use and
- e. No spraying of well kept verges.
